BSN Student Helps Young Caretakers |

Mariah Streck (BSN Class of 2014) was only three years old when her father, then in his early 50s, was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease. Growing up, she was part of the team of family and professionals who took care of her father until his death in 2007. At this point in time, it's estimated that 5.2 million people have this terrible disease. Of that, approximately 200,000 were diagnosed before they turned 65, many in their 40s and 50s.

Mariah is putting her experience to use in order to help other children of early onset Alzheimer's patients. As part of her community clinical placement at Pitt's Alzheimer's Disease Research Center, she introduced the concept of a support group for these young people. "I was doing research on family support groups and other resources when I noticed that there were no groups designed for this particular demographic," explains Mariah. "So, with the support of my preceptor and the Pittsburgh Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association, I created a virtual support group." Mariah became a certified support group facilitator and will host the monthly meetings on Google Hangouts beginning in April 2014. Even after she graduates this month, Mariah plans to continue leading the sessions, one benefit of using distance technology. Undoubtedly, there will be a national, if not international, need for the type of support group she founded. School Receives Grant from the Jonas Center for Scholarships

The School of Nursing is pleased to announce that faculty members Catherine Bender and Donna Nativio successfully sought funding from the Jonas Center for Nursing and Veterans Healthcare to fund scholarships for PhD and DNP students here at Pitt. The grant for \$30,000 will be used to support one PhD Jonas Nurse Leader Scholar, one PhD Jonas Veterans Healthcare Scholar, and one DNP Jonas Veterans Healthcare Scholar over a two-year period. The Jonas Scholar Grants are part of a national effort to stem the nursing faculty shortage and prepare future nurses to better serve America's evolving healthcare system. Pitt is pleased to be among the 110 schools supported by the Jonas Center for Nursing and Veterans Healthcare.



The Jonas Center for Nursing and Veterans Healthcare is a significant funder of academic institutions' efforts to increase the number of nursing faculty so as to adequately prepare appropriate numbers of nurses. In 2013, the American Association of Colleges of Nursing reported the lowest enrollment increase in professional RN programs in the past five years, which they attributed to a shortage of qualified faculty.
