1. School-Wide Accomplishments

Under the direction of the Jacqueline Dunbar-Jacob, PhD, RN, FAAN, the University of Pittsburgh School of Nursing continues to achieve in their mission. The School of Nursing's (SON) mission is to "provide high-quality undergraduate education" and "superior graduate programs in nursing that respond to the needs of health care in general and nursing in particular within Pennsylvania, the nation, and the world." One of the SON's goals is to "produce nurses who conduct evidence-based practices, engage in scholarly activities, and translate knowledge in health sciences and health care to improve healthcare delivery to all human beings." The following report provides data demonstrating that faculty are continuing to advance the practice of nursing in the clinical, research, and teaching arenas, which includes students who are graduating as well prepared nursing leaders.

2. Student Profile

ENROLLMENT

A total of 932 (14.4% male, 19.2% non-whites, and 33.8% out-of-state) students enrolled in the school during the year 2017-18 (Tables 15, 17 and 21 of Appendix B). The total enrollment translates to 842 Full-Time Equivalent (FTE), as shown on Table 16. There was a 2% enrollment increase, as compared to the previous year (2016-17), mostly in the undergraduate enrollment. The number of out-of-state students remained increased by 5.4% (Table 21). As shown in Table 25, the class of 2018 comprised of 156 students of which 6 withdrew from the University and one transferred from the School to other academic centers in the University; none was dismissed from the school. The attrition rate for the African American students admitted in the class of 2018 saw only one out of the four (25%) students dismissed from the program (Table 26). At the graduate level, we received 335 applicants, of which 181 new students were offered admission, yielding an enrollment of 121 new students (67% yield). The enrolled students were distributed in the following: Masters – 35, DNP – 84, and PhD – 2 (Table 24). During the same period, the school graduated 328 students composed of BSN- 214, MSN – 55, PhD – 3, DNP – 49, and Certificate – 1 (Table 29). The school continued accepting non-degree seeking students at both the graduate and undergraduate levels (Table 1).

BSN (PRE-LICENSURE)

The high school applicant pool for the year 2017-18 was 2,005(934 in state, 1071 out-of-state). During the year, 28% (552) of the applicants were offered admission, with 29% (159) committing to enroll in the school. Of the 159 new high school students, 44% were from out-of-state. The School also accepted qualified transfer students into the freshmen and sophomore year classes. In the year under review, 7 (3 internal and 4 external) transfer students were admitted to the school (Table 2).

The school continued to attract and admit students of high academic performance as proven by the ranking and the SAT scores. The incoming students had an average SAT score of 1341 (Table 3).

The University also identifies high school graduates admitted to the freshmen class that are eligible to enroll in the honors college. To qualify for the honors college, the student must have a minimum SAT score of 1350. In the year under review, 24 of the freshmen entering the school met the criteria. The total SAT scores for these students ranged from 1360 to 1600.

During 2016, as observed in Table 4, 198 students took the NCLEX Exam for the first time with a 90.40% pass rate, a slight increase compared to previous year... As a graduation requirement, senior level traditional undergraduates and Accelerated 2nd Degree BSN students are required to sit for a Comprehensive Examination and achieve a satisfactory score. The majority of the students have been achieving the required score in the first attempt. In order to prepare students for the Comprehensive and the NCLEX Exams, special course-based exams and case studies are offered to students at different levels of the program. In addition, the class referenced in the report went through a three-day NCLEX test review. In order to address the low NCLEX pass rates, the school implemented a four-day KAPLAN review course, which all graduating students have to take at the end of the nursing program.

GRADUATE PROGRAMS

The number of applications processed in 2017 for the Master of Science in Nursing (MSN) programs was 33. This was a decrease of 178 from last year (2016 due to the closure of the (MSN) Nurse Anesthesia Area of Concentration that has now become a Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) program. The Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) program increased from last year's 101applications submitted to a total of 236 applications submitted in 2017-18. There was a slight decrease in PhD applications from 17 last year to 10 applications this year.

MSN applications had a slight increase within the Nurse Specialty Role of the Nursing Clinical Nurse Leader (CNL) from 18 applications (onsite & online) in 2016 to 19 applications (onsite & online) in this 2017-18 review period. The Master of Science in Nursing (MSN) for the Neonatal Nurse Practitioner area of concentration showed a decrease with a total of 13 applications submitted in 2016 to 7 applications submitted this year (2017). Nursing Informatics had a slight increase from 6 applications submitted in 2016 to 7 this year (2017). (Tables 23 & 24)

The Doctor of Nursing Practice (DNP) program continues attracting applicants from different areas of specialization and has become one of the most highly esteemed DNP programs in the United States. Compared to the previous year, the 2017 applications increased with 236 applicants seeking admission in various areas of concentration. Of the 181 applications that were completed, 105 were offered admission (95 accepted offer) and 88 enrolled. The low attrition rate may be correlated to the admission of the most qualified applicants, and the well-established quality of faculty advisement committed to student retention. (Table 28). The school graduated 49 DNP students during the 2017-2018 review period, compared to 48 in the previous year while the PhD program graduated 3 students this year from 4 last year. (Table 30)

3. Faculty

Faculty Profile

One hundred percent of the full-time faculty are doctorally-prepared. The faculty holds advanced practice certifications where appropriate and nurse practitioner faculty meet NTF 2012 guidelines.

Newly hired full-time faculty is required to have an earned doctorate. There are 88 full-time professors and 25 part-time professors. The School of Nursing faculty is comprised of exceptionally talented and motivated individuals in the area of scholarship, teaching, and service.
